With technology and social media taking center stage in the daily life experience of our youth, the real life experience of Scouting is more relevant and crucial than ever before. Technology has revolutionized the way we interact with people and the world around us. It has provided a window to the globe; a profound gateway to information, events, diversity of life and perception. For all its benefits, one needs only see the face of a child experiencing camp and nature first hand to realize the gateway can share life experience. It cannot create or replace it. Our children need to know the real experience of childhood, in community and in nature. To this purpose, Scouting is important. Scouting is Real.

The real experience of childhood is why the Simon Kenton Council continues to identify and invest in opportunities that provide youth in our 18 counties the best we can offer. In 2016, our \$35,000 in direct financial support to Project: Camp days afforded over 1,000 youth in hard-to-serve urban areas the real day camp experience of Scouting. Increasing membership, our Lion Pilot Program engaged 378 new kindergarten Scouts in their age-suitable, first year Scouting experience. And thanks to dedicated STEM partner companies, science was an enhanced priority feature for Scouts and advancement at our camps.

With help from Columbia Gas, IGS Energy, and other contributing companies, we provided science-focused education at Cub Scout Day Camp, a STEM merit badge weekend for Cub and Boy Scouts at Camp Oyo, and STEM merit badge workshops at our summer camps. Along with significant improvements completed and underway at all four of our camp properties, not the least of which is the new Honda Nature & Conservation Education Center scheduled to open in Spring 2017, we are poised to serve our youth at an important time for our communities and our future. Scouting is real, counted on to foster strong, timeless values; an appreciation for nature and one another, responsible leadership and citizenship skills, and healthy lifestyles to prepare youth for adulthood. Thank you for being a partner in our efforts, and helping us deliver the real experience of Scouting.



In 2016, the Simon Kenton Council continued to thrive in membership thanks to our recruitment partnership with the Columbus Blue Jackets, OhioHealth Chiller Ice Rinks, and the Columbus Clippers. With their support and a major philanthropic investment from the Columbus Blue Jackets Foundation, we were able to launch the Lion Pilot Program, adding an additional 378 Cub Scouts to our council. The Lion Pilot Program expanded our reach to provide kindergarten-age boys with a Scouting experience that is suitable for their age, skills, and experience levels.

Groundbreaking! The New Nature Center at Camp Lazarus

In October of 2016, Simon Kenton Council, Honda of America, Mfg. and Delaware Area Career Center (DACC) celebrated the groundbreaking on the new **Honda Nature & Conservation Education Center** at Camp Lazarus in Delaware County. Grant funding from Honda and a partnership with DACC has made the 3,456 square foot building possible. The new facility includes a large classroom, which will be home to DACC's Environmental Management course, an activity lab for hands-on learning, and an attached outdoor pavilion.

The center will serve as a tremendous resource for Scouts, local schools, church and community groups, and families. Programming inside the center will include hands-on STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) related resources focused on conservation, recycling, energy and nature study. We look forward to opening the new Honda Nature & Conservation Education Center in the spring of 2017.

Major 2016 Camp Improvements

Our four camp properties are certainly priorities for long-term investment and priceless reward to our Scouting mission. While improvements are engaged through the capital fund, they are made possible thanks to the generous support of high-level donors. Here are just a few examples:

Krebbs Lodge at Camp Falling Rock: new electric, new and re-framed interior walls, insulation, hand-built bunks with new mattresses, updated exterior siding and a new concrete base to the brick exterior.

Messer Lodge coming soon at Camp Lazarus: replacing the removed Oak Lodge, will feature a multi-purpose room, kitchenette, restrooms, and bunk house.

Camp Oyo Dining Hall: new electric lines installed.

Chief Logan Reservation: six new staff cabins installed.

Special thanks to The American Legion! Their \$10,000 gift purchased new mattresses for Camp Lazarus; a gift that will go a long way in providing quality camp experiences for our Scouts and Scouting Families.

Camp Days with Columbus City Schools The ScoutReach program's goal is to

provide youth in hard-to-serve urban areas of Columbus with a safe, quality Scouting program where they can learn leadership skills, gain an appreciation for the outdoors and prepare themselves for cutting edge careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). As part of the ScoutReach mission and the generous support from Battelle and American Electric Power, Simon Kenton Council was able to host three Columbus City Elementary Schools at Camp Lazarus in the spring and fall. More than 1,000 students from Parkmoor Urban Academy Elementary School (Columbus City School), Noble Academy (Charter School) and A+ Arts Academy (Charter School) spent time in our "classroom in the woods."

For many of the students, this was their first time at a camp, engaged in learning outside their classrooms and neighborhood. In addition to providing camp days for these students, the Simon Kenton Council provided about \$35,000 annually in direct financial assistance to deliver Scouting to those in need. This assistance comes in the form of membership fees, uniforms, books, transportation and camp scholarships so that every youth is delivered a quality Scouting experience regardless of financial ability.

IGS Energy Merit Badge Workshop

Energy serves to develop entrepreneurial minds and spirits in local youth. The company also looks to promote sustainability in a way that makes young people think about their personal responsibility for sustainable choices. A new partnership with IGS Energy made it possible for Boy Scouts to accomplish these objectives through an Entrepreneurship and Sustainability Merit Badge Workshop. Scouts visited

the IGS Energy headquarters in Dublin, Ohio to take part in this workshop. Throughout the day, Scouts discussed the meaning of entrepreneurship and the many types of skills it takes to be Tell" and calling 8-1-1 before you dig. a successful entrepreneur.
